Curriculum Structure and Content

Our plan is to develop a sequenced, age-appropriate SMSC curriculum that explicitly includes:

- Spiritual Development: Exploring Christian spirituality, prayer, reflection, and personal faith journeys.
- Moral Development: Understanding forgiveness, justice, courage, and ethical decision-making.
- Social Development: Building friendships, community involvement, and celebrating diversity.
- Cultural Development: Exploring Christian festivals and other cultural celebrations through the "Year of the Festivals" initiative.

Year of the Festivals Integration

- Planned units and activities around major Christian festivals (Advent, Christmas, Lent, Easter, Pentecost) – see RE curriculum.
- Include festivals from other cultures to promote inclusivity and respect.
- See accompanying document Year of the Festivals outline plan.
- Use festivals as opportunities for spiritual reflection, collective worship themes and community engagement.
- Link festivals to SMSC themes such as forgiveness during Lent or friendship and generosity at Christmas.
- Underpin with our Christian values.

Spirituality Policy Alignment

Ensure the SMSC curriculum reflects the school's spirituality policy by:

- o Encouraging daily opportunities for reflection and prayer.
- Promoting spiritual growth through outdoor learning (linked to OPAL programme).
- Supporting pupil leadership in collective worship to deepen spiritual understanding.
- Emphasising spirituality as a personal and communal experience that enriches learning and wellbeing.

Collective Worship

Use collective worship as a core vehicle to deliver SMSC themes, ensuring it:

- Reflects the school's foundation and Christian vision.
- o Is inclusive, invitational and inspirational for all pupils and adults.
- Develops pupils' spiritual flourishing and understanding of Christian values.
- o Provides opportunities for pupil leadership and active participation.

Links to School Development Plan Priorities

- Quality of Education: Embed SMSC in curriculum design and outdoor learning opportunities.
- **Personal Development:** Use SMSC to support mental wellbeing, physical health, and spiritual growth.
- **Behaviour and Attitudes:** Reinforce Christian values through SMSC to foster respectful, inclusive behaviour.
- Leadership and Management: Develop staff expertise in delivering SMSC and collective worship.
- **EYFS:** Introduce foundational SMSC concepts early to support school readiness and parental involvement.
