News from School – Return of the Cloakroom Ninja










Class News - BEECH






Class News - OAK

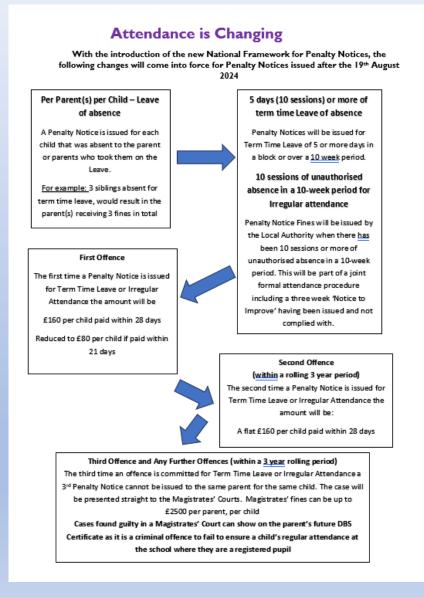
